**4** A man named Goliath, from the city of  
Gath, came out from the Philistine camp to  
challenge the Israelites. He was nearly three  
metres tall **5** and wore bronze armour that

weighed about 57 kilogrammes and a bronze helmet. <sup>6</sup> His legs were also protected by bronze armour, and he carried a bronze javelin slung over his shoulder. <sup>7</sup> His spear was as thick as the bar on a weaver's loom, and its iron head weighed about 7 kilogrammes. A soldier walked in front of him carrying his shield. <sup>8</sup> Goliath stood and shouted at the Israelites, "What are you doing there, lined up for battle? I am a Philistine, you slaves of Saul! Choose one of your men to fight me. <sup>9</sup> If he wins and kills me, we will be your slaves; but if I win and kill him, you will be our slaves. <sup>10</sup> Here and now I challenge the Israelite army. I dare you to pick someone to fight me!" <sup>11</sup> When Saul and his men heard this, they were terrified.

<sup>26</sup> David asked the men who were near him, "What will the man get who kills this Philistine and frees Israel from this disgrace? After all, who is this heathen Philistine to defy the army of the living God?"

### *Sermon*

How tall was Goliath? If you're reading the good news version here at church – he was nearly 3 metres tall. But there is a little note at the bottom of the bible that says – one ancient source says 3 metres while another says 2 metres. So how tall was he?

Well thinking about the reality of this giant, leads us to think about the bible and how it

has come to us in this form. The bible now is a copy of lots of different scrolls. Scrolls created in the 7-10 century AD by Masoretes – they say he was 3 metres tall. Other copies of ancient scrolls of scripture are known as the Septuagint, scrolls from the Qumran cave 4 or from Josephus, they all say nearly 2 metres. So Goliath was somewhere between 6.6ft to 9ft tall.

How tall was Goliath? It's a bit like the story of how big the fish was that you caught on that sunny day. This big, no, no, this big, no no, no, no, it was actually bigger than me. In reality how tall Goliath actually was isn't important. What is important is that he was definitely taller than anyone else on that battlefield and it made the Israelites panic.

All they could see was a man bigger than them, taunting and teasing them : who dares to fight me? Not only was he taller, he had the biggest, most impressive armour ever seen. Facing this huge man, with all the show of wealth in expensive and heavy armour, the Israelites and king Saul were terrified.

And they did nothing. And they did nothing. And they did nothing. They stood still, afraid and unable to decide what to do. So they did nothing.

We know this happens in our lives too, doesn't it? When something awful happens, we often shut down, shut up and stop the clock. We keep the bedroom just how she had it. We keep going to work despite being sacked. We push another final demand into the bin. Faced with a giant of a problem, quite often we just do nothing.

Churches specialise in this behaviour. In my research about the church meeting, most people said something like 'oh it's always been like that' or 'we probably should change but I don't know how'.

Churches are good at knowing the problem – less people coming to church but are quite often doing absolutely nothing about it. How tall is Goliath? Well he's bigger than me, so I don't know what to do. So I will stand still and do nothing.

But when David sneaks along the frontline to his brothers on a bread and cheese mission, he hears and sees Goliath taunting the Israelites and he says v26 'who is this heathen Philistine to defy the army of the living God?' The one thing that David knows about God is that he isn't one for standing still.

He knows that God is the creator of the world. He knows that God breathes life into everything in creation. He knows that the Spirit brings life, because it has brought life to him since being anointed in the previous chapter. He knows that God is not far away but present in our world and interested in us. And this living God does not call us to be like him and expect us to do nothing.

There are times when we all benefit from being still in God's presence, all of us need to be still in times of prayer and retreat for our sanity and for an opportunity to listen to God. But when faced with a giant of a problem, we cannot fail to act.

So in fact, it doesn't matter at all how tall Goliath was. But it really did matter that the Israelites did nothing. For God looked at the world, in all our sin, structural, institutional and regular everyday horrid sin, and did not stand still. He sent his son into battle for us, who died for us and rose again. His death and resurrection gives all of new life. Life for living, life for renewal, life for dancing in the Spirit of God.

When we are faced with a goliath, let us instead fix our eyes on the lord. The lord who is bigger, greater and infinitely wise than any other thing or person. While the army were

only looking and trembling at Goliath, David looked to the lord. David knew that the Lord who protected him from lions and bears, would be the same God who would protect him from Goliath.

How tall was Goliath? It doesn't matter. How big are your problems, it doesn't matter. What does matter is that we take all of our problems to the living Lord. And as we take them to him, we must be willing to be open to his new life. We need to be open to his leading to act.

Do you need to call someone today who you've been avoiding? Do you need to get rid of possessions that you have built around yourself to protect you? Do you need to honest face the pain in your heart rather than cover it over with addiction, selfish behaviour, or total retreat from the world?

May I encourage us all, as a church facing deep challenges to see our development plans succeed, and as a church nationwide facing mission in a whole new world, may we not be bamboozled by the size of the giant. May we not stand still and do nothing.

Instead may draw strength from the living Lord who made us, loves us and gives us his Spirit to seek new life wherever he may lead us.

### **The story of the Lord's Supper**
