Sermon: 'The Righteous Branch, Ola Lawal

Let us pray

Faithful God, speak to us on this first Advent Sunday. Open our hearts to receive your Word and our minds to understand it.

Amen

Today is the first Sunday of Advent. The first Sunday of Advent gives us the opportunity to centre our thoughts on **Hope**. The much needed hope in a year where many had experienced a great loss. Such as the loss of a loved one, loss of job or loss of security due to a broken relationship. Jeremiah's hope-filled prophecy for this first Advent Sunday is a much needed message for many.

The Jeremiah's hope-filled prophecy of the coming King, a righteous Branch. The righteous descendant of David, today is interpreted as the coming of Jesus, the Messiah. However, the circumstances in which the prophecy was spoken at the time of Jeremiah was different. It was more to give hope to the children of Israel who were facing imminent invasion by the armies of Nebuchadnezzar, the king of Babylon. Their king, Zedekiah was already imprisoned. Judah and Jerusalem will soon be decimated and filled with corpses, verses 4-5.

Just as it would have sounded a bit ridiculous to tell someone whose life is crumbling around them, 'don't worry, all will be well and restored, Jeremiah's hope-filled prophecy would also have sounded ridiculous to the inhabitants of Jerusalem at the time, as all they could see is the approaching catastrophe and destruction. Yet, Jeremiah was insistent that God's message to them is hope-filled.

Tragedy may be approaching them for now, but there will be restoration. Not just of daily life but much more. The chief signs of God's favour to His people will be the restoration of David's line. The Root of Jesse is coming soon to renew and restore all things. What an incredible message of hope, safety and unexpected joy. That new life will spring up from what presently looks like a dead stump. As history tells us, the chief tragedies of the Babylonian Exile, was the end of King David's dynasty after nearly four hundred years, of rule. The Babylonians destroyed David's city, burned Solomon's temple, and took David's heirs into exile. At the time the inhabitants of Jerusalem would have felt that God's promise to David, of 2 Samuel 7 verse 16, 'You, will always have descendants, and I will make your kingdom last forever. Your dynasty will never end.' was no longer true. God's promise appeared to have come to an end.

The good news is God's words are true and his promises never fail. This passage, Jeremiah 33 vs. 14 to 16 and Jeremiah 23:5-6, as time went on were interpreted to be speaking about the coming everlasting ruler, the Messiah. The descendant of David who will "execute justice and righteousness in the land". The one for whom we wait in this Advent season. The one whose salvation encompasses not just Judah and Jerusalem, but the whole world.

To a people devastated by loss, Jeremiah's prophecy offered hope: "The days are surely coming, says the LORD, when I will fulfil the promise I made to the people of Israel and Judah" (33:14). All might seem lost, but God still is faithful. The house of David might be cut down, but God is able to bring life out of death. There will always be a descendant of David to be king of Israel.

This Jeremiah's prophecy is also for us. We might have been bruised, battered and cut down. All might seem lost, but God is still

faithful. He is still able to bring new life out of what we perceive as lost.

New branches shall again sprout out of a stump as written in Isaiah 11:1. The reason for this is because Jesus, the Messiah, is for us too. He can heal, renew and restore us. We can hang on to the hope that we will rejoice again because He is the 'Lord Our Salvation'. We can hang on to the hope that the descendant of David whom we await in this Advent season will 'execute justice and righteousness in the land'. In all our lands because His salvation encompasses not just Judah and Jerusalem, but the whole world.

Jeremiah was a forthright man who did not mince his words as we noticed in the earlier chapters. He told the children of His Israel they will be sent into exile if they did not change their ways. He was so persistent with the warnings that he earned the name, 'prophet of doom'. The rulers imprisoned him because of his gloomy prophecies.

Yet, amidst Jeremiah's suffering and the imminent destruction of Jerusalem, he saw hope. He saw the righteous Branch that will spring up. The Messiah who will make things new and shared it with the people who were more used to his gloomy prophecies. When faced with difficult situations we similarly struggle to believe anything positive or hold on to any hope.

However we have hope in Jesus, the Sustainer and Healer. No matter what the media is telling us; or what the doctor's diagnosis says; or what the threatening letter from the bank manager says; or the reality of what our present issue may be; Jesus the righteous Branch can resolve it in His own good time and according to His will. Let us trust Him and put our hope firmly in Him at all times and in all situations.

Secondly, like Jeremiah, let us make it our mission to spread hope during this Advent Season. To speak words of hope to the

weariness, the abandoned, the despairing that the righteous Branch, the Lord our Salvation will come again. To tell all that in the midst of darkness, light is about to break, a branch will sprout. Jesus Christ will come again the second time. He will restore and renew us and our world. **Amen.**

Let us pray

Loving God thank you for your Word, Jesus Christ, who will come again a second time. Help us to firmly put our hope and trust in Him. Remind us to speak words of hope and joy in a world often filled with fear and uncertainty, even despair in this Advent season. **Amen.**
