Welcome to The Bible

The Bible is the most powerful book that has ever been written. TOY SERVICE & NATIVITY PLAY

And hideous tie so kindly meant,

Nor all the steeple-shaking bells

*The Rev. Ruth Moriarty spoke of Shauneen Lambe. Shauneen is a top human rights lawyer who said a Martin Luther King quote inspired her 'the arc of history is long but it bends towards justice.' As we consider the image of the tree of Jesse this Advent (Isaiah 11), we remember that the people of Isaiah's day had waited a long time for change. They longed for mercy and peace – they longed for justice. Every time we see justice

taking place, we glimpse something of the glory of God. The arc of history is long but it bends towards justice, it bends towards the king of justice who is the one who can judge in perfect love and will restore peace to us in the end. May we seek the joy of justice in our lives, and may we seek it for others wherever we can, and may we call for it for all who need it. For when we call for justice, we call for Jesus in his beauty and peace to be present, and He is the one who transforms each of us as we seek him step by step.

A highlight of the service was a video produced by Great Commission. A soft rap to the greatest story ever told. There are bells ting-a-linging, cinnamon aroma and chestnuts roasting on an open fire. Busy shoppers and music from Bing Crosby +But as Bono said “tonight thank God it’s them instead of you”. While we experience the joy of Christmas let us not forget that the destiny of the Christmas baby is to die in our lieu from fairy tale birth to a criminal cross. Thank God it’s Him instead of you. Don’t just remember, respond and surrender for Christ the Saviour is born. (If you have an internet connection, I recommend you see it).

A collection was made for the Family Resource Centre.

Hark! The Herald Angels Sing brought the service to a close.

We were invited to make our way to the parlour for hot drinks and mince pies. Our thanks must go to those who provided the cakes, those who served us and cleared away after such a successful Carols by Candlelight Service.

We hope to help as many people who are feeling the strain of very tight budgets. We hope that helps a little over the expensive Christmas period and know we care about them. I am very grateful for support from Church Members as well as Mission Group members. Thank you to all who gave so generously through the "Food Parcel Appeal Envelopes", as well as the money collected during our beautiful "Carols by Candlelight" service to support the vulnerable people known to our local Family Resource Centre run by Barnet. That collection was £146.11 at Candlelight service. They were delighted to receive also all the beautiful toys, teddies, games and books given at the Toy Service earlier in the month. And all delivered by Lynda Eade. The Family Resource Centre will deliver the food parcels to families they know who are in need of support.

The Carol Singing at Arnos Grove was extremely successful due to the Brownies, Rainbows, Guides and parents and members of our Congregation. Roger Oram said that about 31 people joined in! They raised £291.02 for Baptist World Aid in 2 hours 20 minutes. The public responded well obviously due to the glorious sound as they trundled along up the stairs after a day's work. Many thanks to Val Oram for counting the money and to Sue Rogers for pulling "Hetty", our music box, down to the station in a suit case! That must have helped so much with the sound of music in the air.

I was sad to miss it but was firmly instructed not to be there by Val and Pennie! In actual fact I was at the Royal Free Hospital with Tanya having a consultation and would not have been back in time but I love that feeling of the True Spirit of Christmas echoing around the draughty and lofty Arnos Grove Station and the reaction of the public. Well done everyone!

There is usually a special centre for Christmas Day with a meal provided, warmth and comfort. I believe the Synagogue who support Winter Shelter are taking this over during the Christmas period.
