It is with much sadness that we report that Jean Kearey passed away recently.

After a fall at home back in February leading to an operation and then moving to a Residential Care Home near Enfield, where she suffered a further fall and subsequent spells in and out of hospital her health weakened, sadly leading to going back into North Middlesex Hospital where she died on the 23<sup>rd</sup> June.

She lived in and around Friern Barnet and the Southgate area and worked for some years in the Post Office that used to be in the parade of shops in Friern Barnet Road at the top of Beaconsfield Road.

Jean was a long-standing Church Member, attending Church regularly for many years right up to the 1<sup>st</sup> Covid Lockdown and was a loyal and much-loved member of the Friendship Club, having also previously helped at the Christ Church Women's Guild.

She will be greatly missed by many friends at Christ Church and remembered for her joyful spirit and gracious presence in our congregation. Jean was quiet, with an efficient way of getting on with things. You'd find her regularly, along with a few stalwarts in the Church kitchen on many an occasion, particularly washing up Communion glasses.

Whilst remembering Jean we also think of her surviving sister and sons, Alan and Barry and their families and all of Jeans extended family and friends and send them all our sincere condolences and pray for them all at this sad time.

Her funeral will be held at Christ Church at 11am. on the 7<sup>th</sup> July when we will remember Jean and celebrate her life. This will be followed by a short service at New Southgate Crematorium. It is hoped that both services will be available to view online.

We also note the passing of Betty Manning recently, another long-standing member of the Friendship Club.

Betty worked in Friern Hospital for many years before it finally closed and got to know some of the ladies from the Church who helped in the shop run by the WRVS and was introduced to the Friendship Club, where she was another one of the small group of loyal ladies who kept it going for so long.

Her funeral was at New Southgate Crematorium on the 15th June and was led by Reverend Robert Barthram, in accordance with Betty's wishes.

Betty lived locally throughout her life before spending her later months in a local Care Home. She loved cats and although not having her own, looked after neighbour's cats, including one called "Jerome". Along with collecting "Wedgewood", another love of her life was ballet, and she went to see many performances over the years.

We remember all those known to us who are bereaved at this time. Whilst praying for them, we also pray for all who are, or have been in hospital recently and those who remain unwell.

As the school summer terms come to an end, we think of all youngsters who have had to cope with a somewhat disturbed year of their studies. We pray for them and their parents and all families and trust that they might now be able to have a summer break and holiday, as Covid guidelines allow as we hopefully come out of Lockdown.

He is our forever Lord God and His glory will always be magnified in our lives.
